



Red Star Training

Educators are trained in the Red Star Training Method and they are empowered with:

- > Skills and methodology to impart reading and writing skills of Deaf learners
- > Improving Sign Language skills in Deaf learners
- > Improving literacy and numeracy abilities of Deaf learners
- > This is a partnership programme between DeafNET and De la Bat School for the Deaf, Worcester, SA

DeafNET developed a video for educators on the content of the Red Star training method.

Currently we are busy to develop a complete Red Star Toolkit for Educators at Deaf Schools.

Implementation of Red Star Training Method Zimbabwe

The Red Star training method is our flagship program and it was developed to bridge the gap between sign language and spoken language. DeafNET trained three educators of King George VI School in Zimbabwe in the Red Star Training Method. The training was facilitated by Mrs. Ina Senekal from De la Bat School for the Deaf and the educators that attended the training are implementing the method at their school with great success.







Scholarship Project

DeafNET seeks to empower young Deaf girls from Africa by offering them the opportunity to further their education.

The promotion of education and training is an important activity for DeafNET. It is our vision that the scholarship will develop into an ongoing institution / project at DeafNET.

DeafNET's Scholarship student Samantha Hector from Mauritius started her studies in 2014 with the Links for Life programme and in 2015 she has been in her 1st yr studying Early Childhood Development (ECD). Samantha finished in 2016 her Level 4 ECD training at NID College.





DeafNET's Scholarship student, Loveness Majoni from Zimbabwe started and finished her studies from April 2016 to March 2017 at the NID College as a Beautician.

Ashleen Dammert & Cassandra Janse van Rensburg is currently doing a ECD Level 5 course through CAL Training College.

Mauritania/Senegal Sign Language Dictionary

The Sign Language Handbooks for Mauritania and Senegal have been completed and handed over to Silent Work in 2016 with 1000 words in Arabic SL and 1000 words American SL.



Beekeeping Project (Uganda)

Beekeeping for Deaf People in Africa:

- > To encourage sustainable livelihoods by providing Deaf community with beekeeping skills in agricultural sector so that they can earn an income and become productive in the society.
- > To empower Deaf people through engaging them in beekeeping in order to improve their knowledge about beekeeping and communication skills to become rural entrepreneur.
- > To establish a Deaf friendly beekeeping model which can be replicated in both Anglophone and Francophone African countries.
- > To promote human rights of D/deaf people as well as better training and development.

Ten (10) Deaf persons have been identified and trained in Beekeeping. Follow-up visits is done by our Deaf Project Manager, Edgar Bwire, in Uganda.













CONFERENCES

DeafNET Africa Conference 2016

Johannesburg, South Africa 26 - 30 September 2016

The 4th DeafNET Africa Conference (26 – 30 September 2016) held at the Premier Hotel OR Tambo in Johannesburg - South Africa, brought together an interdisciplinary group of delegates from 29 African countries involved in the fields of deaf education and advocacy. The tone of the main conference was set during opening speeches delivered by DeafNET CEO Mrs Suzette Willemse and DeafNET Chairperson Reverend Attie Smit. This conference engaged African delegates from a wide range of professional disciplines in knowledge transfer and inter-professional collabora-



tion to maximize the wellbeing of African Deaf people and improve their overall quality of life.

The conference was comprised of workshops, plenary presentations and discussions, poster sessions and a gala dinner. The main objectives of the conference included:

- · Strengthening and expanding existing networks
- Gathering and disseminating knowledge that empowers educators of the Deaf to equip Deaf learners with knowledge, social competencies and vocational skills equal to their hearing peers
- Raising awareness in the private and public sectors of society about Deaf human and civilian rights, as well as Deaf potential and abilities including access to equal education on all levels
- · Advocating and promoting Sign Language (SL) as a tutoring language for SL users on all levels of education
- Adopting resolutions and a conference declaration as guiding documents for the next 4 years
- · Electing regional representatives and office bearers

The main conference was divided into the following plenary sessions:

- · Early Childhood Development
- Sign Language and Education
- Adult Education and Training
- Human Rights, Health and Wellbeing
- Deaf Education and Community Integration

A. Red Star Training Method

On 26 September 2016 more than 120 people attended the Red Star Training Workshop at the Premier Hotel, Johannesburg. This workshop was attended by Deaf participants from Deaf schools and organsiations from all regions in Africa as well as Dept of Education and Deaf schools in South Africa. B. Storytelling

The Storytelling workshop was facilitated by Ms Ruth Morgan & Mr John Meletse from the University of Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa.

Deaf culture focuses on the stimulation of the eyes and the enhanced visual perceptiveness of Deaf individuals. Storytelling is important for the Deaf and/or Hard of Hearing persons to share their experience, however in a safe and secure way.

Storytelling is done through video about your life and journeys you had to take to be where you are. It is important for society to see the life from a Deaf and/or Hard of Hearing person's point of view. For the Deaf community it is ideal for the Deaf and/or Hard of Hearing people to share their stories so that the society that we live in can become aware of the difficulties the Deaf persons encounter on a daily basis.

6 March 2016


Three cyclists assisted DeafNET to raise funds for the education of Deaf children in Africa.


