





RED STAR PROCESS

The Red Star (RSP) is an intervention that offers a deeper, more in-depth understanding of reading and writing and written language via Sign Language. As part of our Monitoring and Evaluation Programme, a team from DeafNET visited Chad between 10 - 14 January 2022, for a follow-up visit.













The team also visited CERSOM private school for the Deaf in Cameroon, from 17 – 21 January 2022, for a follow-up visit. The facilitators could gather some positive feedback where marks were improved.

Teachers believe that RSP is a good method where Deaf learners can sign well and read and write correctly.



















ENTREPRENEURSHIP BEEKEEPING

2021 - 2022 has been yet another year for Kakamega Deaf Association (KDA), DeafNET and the Deaf beekeepers, in Kenya. The beekeeping entrepreneurial self-help project for the Deaf people aims to equip rural Deaf communities with knowledge and skills, including sales and marketing skills, including to improve their socio-economic circumstances. The beekeepers have shown incredible resilience despite challenges from COVID-19.









SUMMARIZED ACHIEVEMENTS

- Members are now skilled in beekeeping and understand the activities involved
- At least 14 out of 20 beehives are now fully colonized within a space of just 12 months.
- A community-based organization was established to spearhead the empowerment of Deaf beekeepers in Western Kenya
- Other than the general group apiary, some members have started their own beehives.






HIV TOOLKIT 2

DeafNET is taking a step toward increasing HIV awareness in the Deaf community, in Africa. The HIV toolkit 2 is designed to help leaders, parents, teachers, health workers, community workers' social workers, pastors, spiritual workers, and other partners. It consists of 1 comic booklet, 1 DVD (International Sign), a pamphlet and a HIV poster. It is an important tool that goes beyond language barriers and opens the way to communicate facts and sensitive issues in a deaf-friendly manner. The project has been completed.







THE PURPOSE OF THE TOOLKIT

To provide Deaf accessible HIV/AIDS information and education programmes with supporting visual training and informational material.













SOCIAL COMPETENCE IN LEADERSHIP

A Social Competence in Leadership workshop was held from 27 September till 6 October at the Deaf Family Church Hall in Worcester, South Africa. The training was attended by participants coming from South Africa, Malawi, Uganda, and Swaziland. It was aimed to equip future Deaf facilitators with the essential insights and skills to directly improve leadership in Deaf Organizations in their respective regions.





KDA INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGES

Kakamega Deaf Association (KDA) has been linked to Jinja beekeeping in Uganda since the initiation of the project. Exchange visits took place between the two organizations to improve the quality and effectiveness of the project.

The aim was to:

- Discover and compare knowledge dissemination on beekeeping
- Exchange new ideas and experiences on how to improve
- Observe the erection of beehives in Jinja
- Learn how to handle the beehives and care for bees
- Understand pollination and the positive impact of bees on the ecosystem
- Networking, educational, and cultural exchange
- Develop sales and marketing strategies and skills

SIGN LANGUAGE AWARENESS

Ms. Woinshet Girma, hosted a Sign Language workshop on 29 November - 8 December for 18 health professionals. The purpose of this campaign is to heighten participants' awareness of deafness challenges, Sign Language and Deaf Culture. She also facilitated another workshop from 9 – 12 December on Deaf women victims of gender-based violence. This initiative is to get Deaf women out of isolation, learn their rights, and access the justice system.
