



The 5<sup>th</sup> DeafNET Africa Conference "Capacity building initiatives within the Deaf communities" was held in Johannesburg, South Africa, from 21 - 24 November 2022. The purpose of the conference was to explore new initiatives and align projects and activities, advocate and promote Sign Language, identify areas of personal and community development and mobilise community partnership to give impetus to projects and adopting resolutions.

The different conference sessions and workshops provided a platform for wider discussions on leadership, Deaf education, Sign Language, entrepreneurial leadership and mental health. The conference also served as a forum to raise awareness in the private and public sectors of society of Deaf human and civilian rights, including access to equal education at all levels. 


#### Sign Language Training In South Africa

#### **Highlights and Accomplishments**

Twelve Sign Language training workshops were hosted in collaboration with Department of Social Development and SVE in the Western Cape as part of youth development.

#### **BEEKEEPING IN KENYA**

DeafNET managed to implement beekeeping year 2 successfully in Kenya. Over the past year, DeafNET has worked to promote economic empowerment of deaf persons by providing equipment, knowledge and skills for beekeeping. To ensure sustainability, Kakamega Deaf Association has rolled out some initiatives such as formation of a registered Deaf beekeeping organisation and partnering with local honey producers. The project was handed over to the Kakamega Deaf Association, and DeafNET phased out the project in February 2023.

#### **ENTREPRENEURSHIP TRAINING IN KENYA**

DeafNET in collaboration with Kakemega Deaf Association hosted a entrepreneurship workshop from 21-25 July 2022 in Kenya. Pursuing a self-employed venture frequently requires a strong focus on developing entrepreneurial skills. These skills enable entrepreneurs to run their business better, be independent as well as avoid start-up failure.









#### **RED STAR PROCESS (RSP)**

The Red Star Process is a training method that empowers teachers with skills and methodology to impart reading and writing skills as well as Sign Language skills to Deaf learners. In October 2022, DeafNET in partnership with De la Bat School for the Deaf in Worcester, South Africa, trained 4 educators coming from Cameroon, Chad, Mali and DRC. The workshop was held from 17 October - 18 November 2022, at De la Bat School for the Deaf, Worcester, South Africa.

### FACILITATE LEARNING USING VARIETIES OF DIFFERENT METHODOLOGIES - SOUTH AFRICA

The Facilitate Learning using Varieties of Different Methodologies "**SAQA US ID 117871**" workshop was presented in May 2022. Seven countries attended the workshop: Congo, Malawi, Eswatini, Uganda, South Africa, Mauritius and DRC. The training workshop took place from 9 - 13 May 2022, at De la Bat Church, Worcester, South Africa. The aim of this training course is to equip Deaf facilitators with skills for application in training workshops in a variety of focus areas.

#### SOCIAL COMPETENCE IN LEADERSHIP "SOUTH AFRICA"

Six countries were chosen to attend the second workshop: Malawi, Eswatini, Uganda, Congo, DRC and South Africa. This workshop stressed the importance of further empowerment and capacity building for Deaf people who were previously trained in leadership. The training took place from 16 - 20 May 2022, at De la Bat Church, Worcester, South Africa.

#### SOCIAL COMPETENCE IN LEADERSHIP "MALAWI"

DeafNET, in partnership with Deaf Christian Church, Malawi, hosted a Social Competence in Leadership workshop from 1-5 August 2022, at Shalom Palace Lodge, in Blantyre, Malawi. The training was necessitated by the gaps identified and the among Deaf leaders. The workshop was facilitated by Jimmy Akimu (Malawi) and Edgar Bwire (Uganda).

#### SOCIAL COMPETENCE IN LEADERSHIP " DRC "

The leadership workshop was held from 12 - 16 September 2022, at the National Museum of Arts in Kinshasa. The workshop was facilitated by Edgar Bwire (Uganda) and Debby Shukuru (Congo). The training had as its objective to empower Deaf leaders in social competency skills.

The training took place for five days under the auspice of the National Association of the Deaf, which offered assistance in ensuring that the project becomes a success.






#### **OUTREACH**

#### **HIV AWARENESS RAISING IN AFRICA**

The objectives for these workshops were to mobilise Deaf people to sensitise and raise awareness to prevent sexually transmitted diseases, provide HIV/AIDS information with supporting visual and informative materials and improve ways and means to get the message across about the nature and impact of the pandemic of sexually transmitted diseases. The one-day training took place in five countries

#### HIV AWARENESS-RAISING ~ MALAWI ~

The Deaf HIV/AIDS Awareness training took place at the International Bible College BEREA (IBCB) in Blantyre, Malawi, and was facilitated by Pastor Jimmy Akimu.on 5 November 2022. The participants were selected from different areas and other districts, not only in Blantyre.



#### HIV AWARENESS-RAISING "RWANDA"

Another HIV/AIDS workshop took place in Gicumbi, Rwanda, on 4 February 2023. The workshop was facilitated by Mr Edgar Bwire from Uganda. The participants were selected from different areas.









#### HIV AWARENESS-RAISING ~ SOUTH SUDAN ~

The third HIV/AIDS awareness training for Deaf people in South Sudan which took place on 24 February 2023, in Pajok, South Sudan. The workshop was facilitated by Mr Edgar Bwire from Uganda. Over 20 Deaf participants took part in the workshop. The main objectives were to sensitise and raise awareness to prevent sexually transmitted diseases.



#### HIV AWARENESS-RAISING ~ CHAD ~

Mr Mbaindiguim Djerandil hosted a workshop on HIV/AIDS at Ataltrab, Moundou, Chad on 7 March 2023. He welcomed all the participants and highlighted the importance of awareness raising in addressing prevention, testing and treatment in the Deaf community in Chad.



## MENSTRUAL HEALTH AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS IN DEAF UNITS ~ ZAMBIA ~

Ms Rachel Muuma started raise awareness by teaching deaf learners at school about the importance of menstrual hygiene and proper sanitation techniques. Period poverty has been greatly affecting the education outcomes of deaf girls in Zambia and thus this campaign aims at keeping them in school by providing them with affordable sanitary products.



## SIGN LANGUAGE BIBLE TRAINING CAMP ~ AFRICA~

Pastor Athony Langwenya (Eswatini) and Pastor Jimmy Akimu (Malawi) attended a Sign Language Bible training camp held in Cape Town, South Africa on 24 – 31 March 2023. The main objective of the translation training camp was to equip participants with the necessary skills and knowledge to be able to run a Bible Translation site in their home country.



#### OTHER INITIATIVES ~ DRC ~

The workshop was organised by Deaf women, led by SoCoMo trained Deaf women, under the theme: "Digital education for women's autonomization, the challenge for Deaf women" It was held by Communaute des Sourds de la RDC, our label, in partnership with a church, Église Chretienne Évangélique, and participation of Fondation Bolamu, Minister for disability.
